
Koompkinning

Rehabilitation will include bank stabilisation on the Hotham River and access points for the community.


Yellow is for threatened flora

You may have seen these rather cryptic signs on roadsides, which look like upside down yellow hockey sticks! They serve the noble purpose of providing markers where threatened flora species are located, many of which in WA occur along road verges. Threatened Flora, also known as Declared Rare Flora (DRF), are native plant species that are at risk due to small numbers of mature plants and occurrences at a limited number of locations.

Yellow hockey sticks have just been installed at the Camballing Reserve with the assistance of the Shire of Boddington. They are there to mark the *Gastrolobium* sp. Prostrate Boddington. Most of you know Gastrolobium plants as 'egg and bacon', and there are in fact many species in that Genus of plants. This one is quite special, recorded only in the Shire of Boddington and forming large mats of green, flecked with golden flowers in spring (pictured).

Awareness of threatened and priority flora through placement of signage aims to provide buffers to native plants to prevent incidental damage from activities carried out for roadrelated services and maintenance. This activity is supported by a State NRM funded project.
